Ban on Goods Containing 'Forever Chemicals' Passed in Colorado

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The sale of carpets, cosmetics, food packaging, children's products and other goods containing "forever chemicals" would be banned in Colorado under a bill passed by the state legislature on Wednesday.

If signed by Gov. Jared Polis (D), products containing per-and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) would be barred from sale starting in 2024. PFAS are called "forever chemicals" because some of them don't break down.

- 1. The legislation, H.B. 1345, would also prohibit the sale of fabric treatment, textile furnishings, upholstered furniture, and oil and gas products that contain PFAS.
- 2. Cookware with PFAS won't be barred from sale. The bill would require labels that direct consumers to more information online.
- Exposure to certain levels of PFAS may cause adverse health effects including reproductive problems, developmental delays in children, and increased risk of some cancers, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.

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
